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## INTRODUCTION

This document explains the methods used to create the Funding Resilience: Advancing Multisector Investments for Equity site. It includes definitions for key terms used throughout the site and data sources for the content used to create the tool. The tables shown in each section of this document correspond with the data presented on the website pages.

The process of gathering the information presented in this tool included the following steps: (1) reading each section of the [American Rescue Plan Act](#) (ARPA) legislation, (2) visiting corresponding U.S. government websites to obtain additional information for the administration of ARPA funds (e.g., eligibility, allocation tables, deadlines), and (3) visiting websites and examine information displayed by other organizations that specialize in policy and government affairs to obtain additional information about how ARPA funds are used and allocated (e.g., [National League of Cities](#), [National Conference of State Legislatures](#)).

The following information was extracted directly from ARPA to inform the design of the tool:

- Section number and title
- U.S. department and the government agency responsible for administering the funds
- Subsection title (when applicable)
- Total amount of funding allocation for the section (and subsection when applicable)
- Funding type (e.g., appropriation, allocation)
- Purpose of funding
- Time frame to spend the funds

The following information was extracted from U.S. department websites:

- Eligibility requirements or criteria
- Funding mechanism (e.g., discretionary, mandatory, formula, block)

This tool encourages users to explore ways of using federal funds across sectors. Social determinants of health labels were assigned to each section, guided by the definitions provided in [Healthy People 2030](#). The five categories of social determinants of health, defined in the next section, include (1) economic stability, (2) neighborhood and built environment, (3) education access and quality, (4) health care access and quality, and (5) social and community context. These categories are detailed in the [Breakdown by Social Determinant of Health section](#).

## AMERICAN RESCUE PLAN ACT: BREAKDOWN BY SOCIAL DETERMINANT OF HEALTH

The American Rescue Plan Act: Breakdown by Social Determinant of Health page displays three visuals. The graphic summarizes the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds tracked through legislative appropriations and estimated costs. This number changes when sections of the treemaps are selected. The first treemap shows the amount of ARPA funds distributed by social determinants of health. The second treemap shows the proportion of funds managed by federal departments for each social determinant of health category.

The final table displays the fund amount for the social determinant of health category. While ARPA does not specify that the funding was allocated to address social determinants of health, many sections align with these categories. The table below defines the social determinant of health domains used to categorize funding streams and opportunities and show source material.

The data source that informed the proportion of funds by the federal department and the fund amount came directly from ARPA.

## NOTICE OF FUNDING OPPORTUNITIES

The icons allow users to filter and search current funding opportunities by [social determinant of health category](#). Users can also filter by the status of the opportunity. The closed date was obtained from the Grants.gov website. On occasion, this date may be extended and may not be reflected in the most recent website update. The most recent date of data update is located at the bottom of the page. There are three different application status categories.

- Closed opportunities: deadline for application submission has passed, and the federal agency is no longer accepting applications for this opportunity.
- Current opportunities: application submission time frame is open, and the federal agency is currently accepting and reviewing applications.
- Upcoming opportunities: Information about the funding opportunity is available, but the application submission window has not been opened yet. Applications can be sent at a future date.
